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A Message from Our Grand Master

I express my sincere appreciation to the Masons in Pennsylvania for their outstanding cooperation in the endowment program for The George Washington Masonic National Memorial at Alexandria, Va.

You made it possible for me to present three checks, totaling \$272,811, to the Memorial Association at its annual meeting on

Brethren, it was a great opportunity for me to stand before Grand Lodge representatives from all parts of the country and proudly announce for you:

"Pennsylvania Masons have completed what they started out to do. They have completed the 'Pennsylvania Plan' to help endow the Memorial,'

The first check was for \$5,970, representing \$10 from every Masonic Lodge in Pennsylvania.

The second check was for \$6,841, representing \$1 for each initiate

in 1960. The third check was for \$260,000, representing \$1 for every Mason in Pennsylvania, as of February 22. There was a couple of thousand

dollars extra in the third check for the members we wished we had. I assured the Memorial Association that every penny contributed represented gifts from Masons and Masonic Bodies in Pennsylvania. Not one penny was taken from the treasury of the Grand Lodge.

The following are facts on the program for the Memorial in Penn-

- Every Masonic Lodge in Pennsylvania contributed toward the fund. • The Scottish Rite, York Rite and other Masonic Bodies gave finan-
- cial assistance. • 579 Masonic Lodges have participated in the program 100 per cent.
- The remaining 19 Lodges have made substantial progress. • 204 Masons and Masonic organizations in Pennsylvania purchased
- \$100 Life Memherships in the Memorial Association. Brethren, I expect the 19 Masonic Lodges that have not completed

the program to do so as soon as possible. Then, and only then, can we say that all Masonic Lodges in Pennsylvania are 100 per cent. When the program to endow the Memorial started in Pennsylvania,

I assured you that it was a one-time effort with one exception. I made it clear the \$1 for each initiate would be continued as long

as necessary. In announcing the start of the endowment program in March, 1960, I said:

"The only exception is the \$1 contribution required for each initiate. This will be continued. It gives the new Masonic Memher a personal share in the Memorial.'

The Grand Master's Office will keep complete records on the program for \$1 an initiate. Every Masonic Lodge should keep current

and not wait until the end of the year to catch up.

The Watres Memorial Library in The George Washington Masonic National Memorial is dedicated to Brother Louis A. Watres, R. W. Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

He served as Grand Master in 1916 and 1917. He hecame president of the Memorial Association in 1918 and served in that capacity for twenty years.

I have asked Brother Charles H. Nitsch, R. W. Past Grand Master, to undertake the assignment of opening the Library. I am very happy that he has agreed to do so. It involves a great deal of work and Masonic understanding.

The Library Room on the sixth floor of the Memorial was installed at a cost of approximately \$100,000. It has never been open to the

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania has assumed the responsibility to make this Library Room a Library—a room that Pennsylvania Masons can be proud of.

Brethren, I appreciate your continued generosity to the Christmas and Entertainment Fund of the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown, Pa.

This money not only provides a wonderful Christmas for our less fortunate, but entertainment and pocket money for the Guests throughout the year.

I can assure you this Fund is very important to the operation of the Masonic Homes.

I am not advocating another fund-raising campaign, I am merely pointing out that every Mason in Pennsylvania should make a Christmas contribution to our Guests, regardless of the amount.

The films on the Masonic Homes, "Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown" and "Youth Program," have been shown in nearly 500 Masonic Lodges in Pennsylvania. However, only approximately 40,000 Masons have seen them. This is only 15 per cent of the membership.

Therefore, starting July 1, the Masonic Lodge restriction on the movies will be removed. They will be available to other Masonic Bodies, church groups, civie and service clubs and others.

Showing dates can be obtained from the Grand Master's Office. I hope everything possible is done to keep these movies in circulation.

This is an excellent opportunity to show our outstanding Masonic Homes to the general public.

To further help in the program to have more Masons become acquainted with the Masonic Homes, I urge as many Masonic Lodges as possible to arrange to have Special Meetings in the heautiful Masonic Temple at the Homes.

The contribution has been reduced from \$100 to \$50 by the Committee on Masonic Homes in order that more Masonic Lodges will be encouraged to use these facilities.

Your contribution is used to defray expenses, such as heat, light

You are always welcome to visit the Homes. Guides are available for your convenience. I am sure that we all have a great pride in what we are doing for our less fortunate.

First Masonic Congress Attended by Over 300 Leaders of the Craft

More than 300 Masonic leaders from various Masonic organizations attended the first Masonic Congress ever held in Pennsylvania on Saturday, April 29, at the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown, Pa.

Brother Max F. Balcom, R.W. Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, called the Masonic Congress.

The purpose of the Congress was to discuss Symbolic Masonry and its constructive growth.

In the Panel Discussion, many pertinent questions were brought up. The following is an example:

"Should Masons be prohibited from joining organizations requiring the Blue Lodge as a prerequisite of membership until one year after being Raised?"

Many Masonic leaders felt that some period should be imposed.

For example, Brother Richard A. Kern, R. W. Past Grand Master, and Active for Pennsylvania and Grand Minister of State, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, made the following suggestion:

That a one-month waiting period be imposed for the next year, two months the following year, and continue until six years from now when the waiting period would be six months.

In his opening address, Brother Balcom said: "The program also will point out the philanthropies of Freemasonry along with those of other Masonic Bodies.

"And hefore the day is concluded, I'm sure you will all agree that the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania isn't as rich as many seem to think—and that its obligation to provide a Home for the less fortunate is a staggering liability."

He asked the Masonic leaders to unite forces in their efforts for Freemasonry. However, he pointed out:

"When one Body reflects un-Masonic thinking, then all Masonic Bodies suffer. On the other hand, the good deeds of all Masonic Bodies help Symholic Masonry.

"Continue to talk about Symbolic Masonry and I can assure you that all Bodies requiring the Blue Lodge as a prerequisite will share the benefits."

Brother W. LeRoy McKinley, R. W. Deputy Grand Master, was the Panel Discussion moderator, and gave the summation address.

Brother G. Mason Cochran, Grand Chaplain, delivered the banquet address. Other Grand Chaplains taking part in the program included: Brother Alfred N. Sayres, Brother Joseph E. Law, Brother Donald Baldwin, and Brother Arthur Murray.

One of the highlights of the Congress was a forty-five minute bus tour of the 1,500 acres of the Masunic Homes. Guests at the Homes served as Guides.

Youth from the Children's Home played the organ before the Congress started in the morning and afternoon. The Youth Chorus from the Masonic Homes sang "America" at the start of the Congress.

A student from the Thomas Ranken Patton Masonic Institution for Boys led in the Pledge of Allegiance, The Patton School chorus entertained at the Banquet.

Youth from the Masonic Homes and Patton School served as ushers, aided registration and assisted with the parking.

In a personal letter to all those attending the Congress, Brother Balcom said:

"When you return home, I urge you to sponsor Masonic Conferences on local levels. In this way, all Masonic Bodies in Pennsylvania would work toward one goal—the constructive growth of Freemasonry.

"This growth will afford all Bodies requiring Blue Lodge membership as a prerequisite a greater opportunity for service and expansion."

In summarizing the financial problems of Grand Lodge, Brother Ball said:

"Many of our Brethren consider Grand Lodge to be a very wealthy Institution, free from financial worry. Without question, Grand Lodge is in very good, sound financial condition and operating in the black.

"However, Grand Lodge is beset with the same problems as any business or individual. Costs are rising, and inflation is increasingly taking its toll."

In pointing out that the expenditures of Grand Lodge are very closely budgeted, Brother Ball said: "The most scrious long-range problem affecting the income of Grand Lodge is the continuation of income from Gifts, Wills and Bequests. In the past, large sums of money have come from the benevolence of our members and friends."

He said that in the past Grand Lodge re-invested income from endowment funds, but today the income is used in the operation of the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown.

In closing, Brother Ball reminded:

"Charity is one of the Basic Tenets and Purposes of Freemasonry. The welfare of our fellowman is one of the responsibilities of a good Mason.

"Masonic Bodies and attendant organizations have led the way for every Mason to participate in charities and philanthropies of his particular choosing."

Brother Balcom said he was very pleased with the Congress and hoped that many Masonic Congresses would be held in local communities in the months ahead,

On his retirement as Librarian and Curator of the Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Pennsylvania as of April 30, 1961, Dr. William J. Paterson terminated a long and distinguished service to Freemasonry.

Long recognized as the Dean of Masonic Librarians in North America and an authority on Benjamin Franklin, Brother Paterson began his service with the Grand Lodge Library in 1914.

A Master Mason since 1907, he served as Worshipful Master of Gothic Lodge No. 519 in 1919 and also served as Secretary of this Lodge for nearly 20 years. Since 1907 his activity in the Masonic fraternity has never ended. To list the affiliations and honors conferred upon him during the past 54 years would require many columns of this issue.

The author of many Masonic publications, he was also well known for his speaking ability. He studied at the University of Pennsylvania under Dr. Henry Darrach, a Genealogist and authority on library science. Brother Paterson received an honorary doctorate from the College of Sciences, Washington, D. C., in 1923.

Gracious and friendly to all, Brother "Billy" Paterson (as he is known to a host of Masons and friends) will forever command the respect and love of those who have visited or communicated with the Library and Museum in the Masonic Temple, Philadelphia, Pa.

The meeting of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association on Washington's Birthday in Washington was thoroughly discussed by the R. W. Grand Master. This is reviewed elsewhere in this

Brother William E. Montgomery, new Chairman of the Committee on Masonic Culture. suggested that the District Deputies make sure each Lodge has an Aide, and a Committee on Culture; also that each Lodge is using the many booklets that have been made available.

Improved Lodge attendance and more interesting meetings were reviewed by Brother Earl F. Herold, the R. W. Scnior Grand Warden. Definite advance planning is essential to the success of this program, and the Lodge Notices should be used to inform the Memhers of the programs.

The Membership statistics for 1960 were outlined by the Grand Secretary who also commented on the bigh number of suspensions for non-payment of dues and abnormal rejections in some Lodges. More prompt forwarding of Annual and Monthly Returns, Auditing Committee Reports and 50-Year Masonic Service Emblem data was requested.

The Committee on Finance and the Committee on Masonic Culture held their usual quarterly meetings. Many other conferences had been arranged with the Grand Master and the other Officers.

March Quarterly Communication

The March Quarterly Communication on March 1st, was attended by 525 Members representing 242 Lodges.

Among the communications from other Grand Lodges were requests for fraternal recognition from the Grand Lodge of Finland and the Grand Lodge of Luxemburg, which were referred to the Committee on Correspondence, as was further information relative to similar previous requests from the Grand Lodge of Belgium and the United Grand Lodges of Germany.

The Committee on Finance outlined the Receipts and Expenditures for the quarter ending February 15, 1961.

Proposed amendments to the By-Laws of eight Lodges were received and referred to the Committee on By-Laws. The Resolutions submitted by this Committee were adopted wherehy the proposed amendments of six Lodges were approved while those of four Lodges were not approved.

Quite a few Lodges are holding extra meetings in the beautiful Masonic Temple at the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown. The R. W. Grand Master announced that the contribution from the Lodges holding such meetings has now been reduced from \$100 to \$50.

The R. W. Grand Master also announced that the very popular and interesting color movies on the "Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown" and the "Youth Program," which are now shown only in our Lodges will he available to other groups after next July 1. Any group desiring these films should contact Brother Arthur T. Moore in the Grand Master's Office in Philadelphia.

The Committee on Temple, which is in charge of the magnificent Masonie Temple in Philadelphia, reported expenditures of slightly over \$31,000 for the first quarter.

Annual Grand Masters' Conference

The Conference of Crand Masters of Masons in North America was held in Washington on February 20 and 21. It was very well attended by Grand Masters from other countries as well as our own, along with many Distinguished

Brother W. LeRoy McKinley, R. W. Deputy Grand Master, in his comprehensive report, pointed out that each Grand Lodge in the United States is a sovereign body, supreme

Many problems confronting Masonry were discussed by the Grand Masters. Papers were presented on the following three subjects:

1. Has a Grand Lodge now in amity with a Grand Lodge within a national sovereignty the right to recognize another Grand Lodge within that same country with which the Grand Lodge already recognized is not in

- 2. Should this Conference endeavor to organize an International Masonic Conference?
- 3. Should Lodges of Research be encouraged in our Grand Lodges?

The Grand Masters commented on the above subjects, but no voting indicative of the feeling of the individual Grand Masters was taken.

Brother McKinley, who is Program Chairman for next February's Conference, remarked that two most important problems continue

- 1. How can we interest more young men in Freemasonry?
- 2. How ean we increase attendance at Lodge Meetings?

Philadelphia Freemasons' Memorial Hospital Now Recognized as Geriatric Unit

By C. Howard Wither, Chairman of the Hospital Committee, Committee on Masonic Homes

We feel that 1961 will be considered a new milestone for Freemasonry at the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown, Pa.

The American Hospital Association has listed the Philadelphia Freemasons' Memorial Hospital as a geriatric unit, and rightfully so.

The hospital care constitutes a four-phase method of treating and handling geriatric cases. They are:

1. Observation Admitting Floor 2. Definitive Acute Treatment 105 beds 3. Prolonged Convalescent Care 4. Permanent 24-hour Custodial Care 90 beds

(Total available beds-300) The first stage in admitting Guests to the Hospital is performed on the observation floor, to take care of illnesses for approximately

three-day periods. If a Guest has an illness that extends beyond this point, he or she will be transferred to the central definitive area where all the cases of acute, subacute and chronic illnesses, together with surgical cases, are cared for and maintained.

The entire consulting staff of 100 visiting physicians utilizes and spends professional efforts to reconstitute their illnesses, and/or recommend surgery to be performed by three cooperating institutions—the Lancaster General Hospital, Harrisburg Hospital and the Polyclinic Hospital of Harrisburg.

The Dispensary Department takes care of all ambulatory Guests and new admissions. also including dental care, chiropody and physiotherapy.

New Guests admitted to the Homes are first sent to the Hospital and permitted to stay until laboratory, X-ray and cardiology studies are completed. A married couple coming to the Homes usually receives a double room, or adjoining rooms, until they are properly surveyed.

New Guests are discharged to the cottages best suited to them, the Allegheny Rest Home if needed, or made permanent in the Hospital if the physical condition so warrants.

The average age of the Hospital Guest is 82 plus. Presently, we have three Guests that have reached 99 years of age. The hospital maintains an average daily census of 270.

The ambulance and dispensary have recently been equipped with emergency resuscitators called Pneophores which are manufactured by Mine Safety Appliances Co.

A Department of Chiropody was established when the need became recognized as a part of the full geriatric care required.

Our Hospital is proud of the medical care our Guests receive. With the use of the pulsating mattress, sheep skins, and lanolin therapy. we can truthfully say that we maintain the lowest percentage of bed sores and bed ulcer cases of any hospital serving geriatric Guests.

The Laboratory is now fully equipped and is capable of doing all required laboratory procedures except tissue pathology.

Recently, a walking blood bank was organized so that transfusions can be given directly to the Guests. The donors include the Homes and Hospital employes.

Brother Harry P. Shawkey "The Man With the Cane" Given the Rush Award

Brother Harry P. Shawkey of North Star Lodge, No. 241, Warren, Pa., long known as "The Man With the Cane," was honored recently as recipient of The Benjamin Rush Award. This annual award is given by the Pennsylvania Mcdical Society to some non-professional individual who has made an outstanding contribution to the medical field.

Brother Shawkey, who will be 87 in October, has been most generous and long dedicated to the financial support of Zem Zem Crippled Children's Hospital in Eric, Pa.

His first efforts for crippled children started in 1915 when he began collecting tin foil which he sold, turning the funds over to the Shrine Hospitals. He later began a hobby of collecting odd-shaped sticks, hranches and roots for fashioning canes and walking sticks for his friends.

This hobby of whittling canes has resulted in an enterprise that has netted over \$15,000.00 for Zem Zem Hospital. He asks a minimum of \$5.00 for each cane but is frequently given much more. His canes have been mailed to many distant parts

Circulation Department Transferred to Philadelphia

The first edition of THE PENNSYLVANIA FREE-MASON provided two great surprises for the Committee on Masonic Culture. Instead of approximately twenty to twenty-five thousand subscribers we received over seventy thousand and following the second issue we had several thousand returns for change of address. Not having anticipated either so great a number of subscribers or returns we had not provided the Library Staff, in the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia, with sufficient help to deal with these conditions. In order that a study could he made and an efficient system of caring for these problems developed, the circulation department was moved to Warren.

The handling of these matters has now been systematized. The key to the situation lay in the appointment of an Aide to the Committee on Masonic Culture, who with the co-operation of the Secretary, forwards to the Committee all new subscriptions, change of addresses and withdrawals. Procedures having been developed which in the future will enable the staff in the Library in Philadelphia to care for this phase of publishing THE PENNSYLVANIA FREE-MASON the department was transferred on January 1, 1961.
