## Bro. Wells Takes Office As State's Grand Master

Bro. Walter P. Wells of Coudersport, senior judge of Pennsylvania's 55th Judicial District, Potter County, has been installed as R. W. Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania.

The installation to the highest office in Freemasonry in the state took place during the Annual Grand Communication held in Founders Hall at the Milton Hershey School in Hershey, on December 27, 1977.

He succeeded Bro. John L. McCain of Pittsburgh.

A graduate of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania and the Dickinson School of Law, Bro. Wells first entered the practice of law in Coudersport with his late father, John Walter Wells.

Admitted to the bar in 1931, he was elected district attorney for Potter County in 1933 and served in that post until 1952.


Bro. Wells became president judge of the 55th Judicial District in 1952 and served in that capacity until 1975.

#### A Unity of History and Brotherhood

There is an important, historic relationship between Pennsylvanians and Scandinavians which adds special significance to our trip. Under a charter granted by King Gustavus Adolphus, his Swedish countrymen established the first permanent settlement in what is now Pennsylvania in 1643. It was situated at Tinicum on the banks of the Delaware just to the south of present-day Philadelphia. Along with Jamestown and Plymouth, Tinicum is one of the three birthplaces of America.

Long-standing traditions of Freemasonry throughout the Nordic lands will add a memorable spirit of international brotherhood to our travel experience. Denmark's first lodge, "St. Martin", was established in 1743. In 1792, Freemasonry was officially recognized by the Danish crown and the ruling prince henceforth became Grand Master. A Danish king, Christian X, was Grand Master from 1912 to 1947.

In Sweden, Masonry dates back to 1735 and the nation's "Mother Lodge", St. Jean Auxiliare, was founded in 1752. An orphanage founded by the fraternity in 1753 is a pride of the Swedish Craft today. A royal decree of 1796 declared that all Swedish princes are by right of birth Freemasons. The present Grand Master is His Royal Highness Prince Bertil.

There are more than 16,000 brethren and 27 lodges in Norway, where the first lodge, "St. Olaus of the White Leopard", dates from 1749. Since Norway was part of Denmark until 1814, then a dependency of Sweden until 1905, Masonic ties between the three kingdoms are exceptionally strong. Stately Freemason's Hall in Oslo is a landmark of that lovely

Some 3,500 proud Finns in 78 lodges are Masonic brethren, though ancient rites of Freemasonry have been interrupted by Russian imperial domination and later by Nazi violations. Finland has a 220-year Masonic history, for the first lodge, "St. Augustin", was founded in 1756 under the Grand Lodge of Sweden.

## Where we're going...






