## Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania **Publishes History**

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. as one appropriate means of celebrating the 200th anniversary of its independence from the Grand Lodge of England, will publish a two-volume, comprehensive history written by historian Wayne A. Huss, Ph.D.

The first volume of the history, titled The Master Builders: A History of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania, is now available through the Library and Museum at the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia (See coupon below). The second volume is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1987. A third volume consisting of portraits and biographies of Grand Masters is expected to be published in 1988.

Dr. Huss graduated from Ursinus College in 1971 and earned a Master's degree at Villanova University in 1973. He attended the University of Virginia before enrolling at Temple University in 1978 where he studied Early American, French, English and intellectual history. He was awarded a Ph.D. in January of 1985

The title of his doctoral dissertation was, Pennsylvania Freemasonry: An Intellectual and Social Analysis, 1727-1826. It proved to be a complimentary view of the fraternity, proving that Pennsylvania Freemasonry accepted as members men from all occupations, all social classes, and at most levels of

wealth. Freemasonry truly advocated brotherhood, equality, religious toleration and civic responsibility.

The fraternity adhered to a scientific, rational view of the world and its ethics were composed of the middle-class virtues of sobriety, thrift and industry.

Volume I of The Master Builders presents a comprehensive narrative which places the development of the Masonic fraternity within the context of the broader society. It is an approach that had not been followed in earlier works dealing with Pennsylvania Freemasonry.

The fact that Dr. Huss is not a member of the fraternity lends a great deal of credibility and objectivity to his study. The Master Builders is filled with numerous interesting insights and contains many heretofore unknown details pertaining to the fraternity's past. The narrative is augmented by many illustrative charts, tables, graphs and photographs.

Sources of information for the history include more than 55-hundred pages of closely-printed Grand Lodge minutes and dozens of non-Masonic works. By tediously combing through well-preserved manuscript records, Dr. Huss has been able to compile comprehensive membership statistics, including occupation backgrounds, on over 90,000 individuals.

Volume I deals with the period from the origin of the Grand Lodge to the dedication, in 1873, of the Masonic Temple on Broad Street in Philadelphia. Voume II will cover the period from 1874 to 1986.

Volume I will be on sale in the Library and Museum of the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia beginning on Friday, September 26, the day of the 200th anniversary celebration. The coupon that accompanies this article can be used to order the History by mail.

# Pennsylvania Celebrates Masonic Bicentennial

wo hundred years ago, on Sep-L tember 26, 1786, 13 individual lodges met in Philadelphia to, according to the minutes of that meeting, "... establish themselves as a Grand Lodge independent of Great Britain or any other Authority."

The previous day, at the September Quarterly Communication of the Grand Lodge on September 25, 1786, the question of Masonic independence had been resolved. A motion to sever ties with the Grand Lodge of England "...except those of Brotherly Love and Affection, which they will always be happy to cultivate and preserve with all Lodges throughout the Globe" was unanimously adopted.

The minutes of the meeting close with the statement: "This Lodge, acting by Virtue of a Warrant from the Grand Lodge of England, was closed forever."

No Grand Lodge operated in Pennsylvania for a period of less than 24 hours, until the Grand Convention of the 13 lodges on the 26th when it was resolved, again unanimously, "...that the Lodges under the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, lately held under the authority of the Grand Lodge of England, will, and now do form themselves into a Grand Lodge, to be called the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, and Masonic Jurisdiction thereunto belonging..." continued to page 3.

Before the day ends at about 4:00 p.m., those attending will have viewed a special ceremony at 11:00 a.m. in which the officers of the Grand Lodge will rededicate Grand Lodge Hall in marking the completion of a renovation program begun in 1979 and the 75th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the first major building constructed on the grounds of the Masonic Homes—and a 1:30 p.m. parade in which as many as 1,500 Masons, most of them members of colorful shrine units from various parts of the state, will participate.

be placed in a new keystone-shaped box with Masonic materials of today.

The vault will be covered with the white marble capstone that was also recovered from the 1868 cornerstone. The damage to the capstone (see photo below) that occurred as it was being removed from the top of the cornerstone chamber has been repaired. It will serve the same function by capping the vault for the new depository for the old and new Masonic materials.

The public ceremony will be an adaptation of the cornerstone ceremony conducted in 1868. Because of limited space in the Grand Foyer where the ceremony will take place, the proceedings will be relayed by closed circuit, color television to Corinthian and Renaissance Halls on the second floor. Masons not directly involved in the ceremony, their ladies and other family members, and the general public will be seated in either hall beginning at about 2:30 p.m.

No ticket or identification is required. Guides will assist visitors to the seating areas. About 2,000 persons can be accommodated in the lodge rooms.

The 7:00 p.m. Special Communication of the Grand Lodge is a private meeting open only to Master Masons.

Members of the fraternity do not have to be members of the Grand Lodge to attend, but will have to present a current dues card.

The evening meeting, in the place of the regular September Quarterly Communication, will be held in Corinthian Hall, but will also be televised to Renaissance Hall in anticipation of a large crowd for

the anniversary celebration.

All reservations for the 5:00 p.m. dinner in the Masonic Temple have been requested. Those who sent in ticket requests by using the coupon in the June issue of *The Pennsylvania Freemason* after June 30 had to be turned away. The 1,000 available seats had been almost immediately taken up by those who acted quickly.



A number of distinguished Masonic leaders will visit Pennsylvania to participate in the anniversary celebration. Among them will be Bro. J. M. Marcus Humphrey of Dinnet, Grand Master Mason of the Grand Lodge of Scotland, and Bro. Michael W. Walker, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of

Ireland.


Two special communications of the Grand Lodge have been planned for September 26. Both will be held at the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia.

The photographs on pages 4 and 5 show the concrete work that was done in transforming what had been a wood-covered, dirt floor in the old theater section to the left of the entrance and a storage area for clothes and supplies to the right. The ice cream parlor (see the artist's drawing on page 6) is to the left of the entrance in what had been the theater area, and the museum is to the right in the former storage space.

Most visitors to the Masonic Homes in the past entered Grand Lodge Hall from the Village Green which is actually the rear of the building. Upon completion of the renovation, and beginning with the open house during Rededication Day on Saturday, October 18 (see story beginning on page one), the main entrance for visitors will be from the front of the building.

A great deal of interesting items will be


displayed, including an antique piece of fire fighting equipment and an old player piano. Both are being restored for use or display in the new facilities.



# **Summer Seminars** for **SOLOMON II**®

More than 15-hundred lodge officers participated in a series of SOLOMON II Seminars conducted during the summer at the direction of the R.W. Grand Master, Bro. Carl W. Stenberg, Jr.

The first of three seminars was held at Jaffa Temple in Altoona on Saturday, July 12. Zembo Temple in Harrisburg was the site of the second session on Saturday, August 9 and the third was held at Lehigh Consistory in the Valley of Allentown on Saturday, August 16.

Invitations were issued to the Worshipful Master, Senior Warden, Secretary and SOLOMON II Task Force Chairman for each of the 548 lodges in the state. The District Deputy Grand Masters and the Regional and Assistant Overseers for Project SOLOMON II were also in attendance.

All three sessions were conducted by Bro. John R. Graham, a Massachusetts Mason who owns a public relations firm in Boston. Bro. Graham is a talented, dynamic Mason who has created the public relations programs now being conducted by the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association and is working with the Supreme Council, Ancient Accepted Rite, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction in the development of programs for improving membership.

Each program was designed to build the interest and support of the leadership in the lodges in working for the success of Project SOLOMON II, the Rebuilding of Freemasonry in Pennsylvania.





The Wendell August Forge-designed award program will be used to specifically recognize those who contribute \$1,000. \$5,000, \$10,000, \$25,000 and \$50,000 to the Pennsylvania Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children.

The symbol is stamped on a 10-inch diameter aluminum plate as the award for a \$1,000 contribution. A gift of \$5,000 is recognized by the stamping of a 9 by 12-inch beveled, bronze tray.

Donors of at least \$10,000 will receive an award in which the symbol is cut from pewter and placed on a 10-inch, round bronze plate. \$25,000 contributions earn a pewter cutout that is displayed on a background of black velvet inside a 12-inch square walnut frame.

Contributions of \$50,000 or more will be recognized by an award that features a nine-inch sterling silver plate, also displayed on a black velvet background, but in a 15-inch square walnut frame. Both framed awards will also feature a bronze plate on which the name of the contributor will be engraved.
