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Grand Lodge Gives \$4,716 Contribution To Memorial Assn.

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania has given \$4,716 to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association.

The presentation was made prior to the association's annual meeting February 22 at Alexandria, Va.

The contribution represents \$1 for each initiate into the Fraternity in Pennsylvania in the preceding year. This continuing Grand Lodge contribution is part of the "Pennsylvania Plan."

Under the plan, the Grand Lodge presented about \$300,000 to the association nine years ago and since then \$1 for each initiate.

In all, \$76,644 was reported contributed to the association this year by all the Grand Lodges. A breakdown of the amount shows:

-\$19,218 for the endowment fund. -\$55,676 for maintenance fund.

-\$ 1,750 for landscaping fund.

It took \$174,000 to operate the Memorial last year. This included \$15,000 for a reserve fund to meet future emergencies.

Of the total operating cost last year, \$54,000 was contributed by Grand Lodges and \$122,000 was income from a \$2.8 million endowment.

Library Starter Set

Rare Books Available to Lodges

In keeping with this year's centennial celebration of the Grand Lodge Library, the Grand Master is encouraging Lodges to establish their own libraries. Bro. Hiram P. Ball, R. W. Grand

Master, is making available six Grand Lodge volumes on Freemasonry as a starter set for Lodges interested in beginning a library.

These volumes also are available to Lodges which already have libraries.

The number of starter sets is limited and requests will be filled as received. The starter set includes three volumes

of "Freemasonry in Pennsylvania." These rare and attractive books have been compiled from the early records of Lodge No. 2 in Philadelphia. The books cover the years 1757 to 1855.

Two rare volumes of "Old Masonic Lodges of Pennsylvania (Moderns and Ancients)" are featured in the starter set. Covering the years 1730 to 1791, these books relate to Lodges which have surrendered their Warrants or affiliated with other Grand Lodges. They also contain a history of Army Lodges and those that have assisted in the formation of other Grand Lodges.

piled the two volumes from the records in the archives of Grand Lodge.

The sixth volume in the starter set is "History of Masonic Knights Templar of Pennsylvania." This beautiful book, also by Bro. Sachse, is a full account of Templarism in the state from 1797 to 1919.

Lodges interested in receiving a starter set should apply through their District Deputy Grand Master. It is recommended this be done as soon as possible.

There will be no charge except shipping costs for any of the six volumes.

Lodges which apply for the set also will be placed on a list to be notified by Grand Lodge when other duplicate books are available.

Bicentennial City Gets Conference

The annual Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America. usually held in the nation's capital, will be held in Philadelphia in 1976.

The conference will be held in February but as yet no dates have been set.

All the officers of Grand Lodges are coming to Pennsylvania for the 1976 observance of the 200th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

The decision to bring the important meeting to Philadelphia, home of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, was made at the conference sessions last February 23-24 in Washington, D.C.

At that time a seven-member committee, known as the Permanent 1976 Committee of Grand Masters of Masons. was elected.

It is working under the chairmanship of Bro. Thomas B. McIntosh, Jr., M. W. Past Grand Master of Louisiana.

The committee will encourage and report various activities being planned by Masonic Jurisdictions for the 1976 national celebration.

The opening address in a group dis- we are concerned enough to do these cussion at the Conference of Grand Masters was given by Bro. Hiram P. Ball, R. W. Grand Master. He spoke on "The Masonic Celebration of the 200th Anniversary of 1776." Following are excerpts from his address:

"We in Pennsylvania are concerned, just as Freemasonry throughout the United States is concerned, with the form our participation should take in this mammoth, national celebration.

We should cherish with pride the fact that Freemasonry was intimately interwoven in the building of the greatest country in the world today.

Much of our country's history, as you know, is steeped in Freemasonry. Many of America's early leaders and greatest men were members of the Fraternity.

Let me share a little of what we plan to do in Pennsylvania in 1976, and why

things.

Our concern with this eventful year began showing itself nearly three years ago when the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania appointed a special 1976 Committee. It has already done much toward formulating our program.

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania has accepted the challenge. We will share ideas and information, and cooperate with other Grand Lodges to make the 1976 celebration a success in every way.

We not only have a special 1976 Committee working but, under the authorization of Bro. John K. Young, when he was Grand Master, a fund was created which will total \$250,000 in 1976. This fund will be used on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania to

'Let Us . . . Emulate Him and Show Concern'

Chilly winds whipped across historic Valley Forge as more than 2,000 Masons, their families and friends attended the Grand Lodge's fourth annual wreath laying ceremony at the George Washington at Prayer Statue at Freedoms Foundation.

Highlights of this tribute to a great American came when Bro. Hiram P. Ball, R. W. Grand Master, gave the message and, accompanied by Grand Lodge Officers, placed the wreath at the foot of the statue.

The public ceremony last Feb. 14 was conducted under the general chairmanship of Bro. David J. Godschall, District Deputy Grand Master of the 6th Masonic District.

Taking part in the impressive program were the Harrisburg Scottish Rite Choir, under the direction of Bro. James E. Sawyer, and the Concert Band of Rajah Temple in Reading. The band was under the baton of Bro. William H. Levan.

Other Bodies participating in the processional included Grand Chapter, Grand Council and Grand Commandery; eight Scottish Rite Valleys; four Shrine Temples and representatives of the Tall Cedars of Lebanon, National Sojourners and the Order of DeMolay.

In his message the Grand Master told the gathering:

"It took one important thing—concern—to bring each of you here before the statue of this great man kneeling in prayer . . .

"Every American citizen must begin showing this same concern if our country is to overcome the challenges of war and world tension, hunger, pollution, crime and discontent . . .

"Bro. Washington was concerned with the issues of his day. He committed himself to those things which meant the most, whether it was on the battlefield, in the field of government or in his personal life . . .

"Let us, my Brethren, emulate him and show concern. Let us give of ourselves as much as he gave of himself. Let us become involved and do something about the challenges our country faces today."















Middletown Observes Centennial

The new Temple on W. Emaus Street is a two-story, tan brick veneer Masonry building.

Generally, the Lodge Room walls are prefinished plywood with T-bar ceiling and flush lighting. The floor is carpeted wall-to-wall.

The first floor Social Room has rest room facilities and a kitchen with serving counter. Walls, ceiling and lighting are the same as in the Lodge Room. Wall-to-wall carpeting covers the stage and floor of the social area.

The building features gas heating and air conditioning.

The parking area, accessible from Nisley Street, holds about 30 cars.

Despite the inclement weather, the March Quarterly Communication was well attended in Corinthian Hall in the Masonic Temple in Philadelphia.

Committee and Trustee Reports

The usual reports were concise and informative. The ever-busy Committee on By-Laws reviewed the by-laws submitted by 27 Lodges, most of which were ap-

proved in whole or in part.

The report of the Committee on Finance for the first fiscal quarter indicated receipts of \$2,590,220 and expenditures of \$2,167,200. Upon the recommendation of this committee, resolutions authorizing the sale of two properties were adopted.

The Committee on Masonic Culture reported that the responsibility for publishing "The Pennsylvania Freemason" has been transferred to the Office of the Grand Master. The Speakers' Bureau is being augmented and some of the popular booklets are being rewritten and, it is hoped, will be available in the near future.

The renovations to the fourth floor of the hospital at the Masonic Homes at Elizabethtown are progressing on schedule and should be completed prior to the June Quarterly Communication which will be held at the Masonic Homes. The Guest Fund is slightly less than last year. Because of the hospital waiting list, applications for non-ambulatory Guests cannot be accepted at this time. Grand Lodge was pleased to receive a check for \$10,000 from University Lodge No. 610 for the Masonic Homes expansion program, and a check for \$3,000 from Meridian Sun Lodge No. 158 for furniture in the new fourth floor hospital rooms.

Ten of the Patton Masonic School students are expected to graduate June 5, and it is hoped to have a full enrollment of 60 students next fall.

Improvements to the Masonic Temple at One North Broad Street are moving ahead as planned. The Committee on Temple expenditures for the first quarter were \$80,435.

Membership Statistics

The number of Lodges remained at 610 in 1970. The preliminary membership statistics show a net loss for 1970 of 2,616, slightly higher than the previous year. While 4,721 were initiated, there were 6,013 deaths, dropping the total to 242,404 as of December 27,

Donations for this Memorial made by the Grand Lodges totaled over \$76,000. All Lodges are still requested to donate \$1 each year for each new initiate. Bro. John L. McCain, R. W. Junior Grand Warden, highlighted the 52nd annual meeting of the Masonic Service Association, pointing out our fine participation in the Hospital Visitation Program.
